Fruit & Vegetable sales:

Fruits like watermelon, bananas and pawpaw were harvested for this quarter however, this was mainly for home consumption. No information on vegetable crops harvested or sold, was provided for this quarter.


Root crop sales:

Taro was the only root crop harvested and supplied by the farmers in this quarter. This was sold at an average price of \$5/kg generating a total of one thousand dollars.

Land use




83% of land utilized for agricultural purposes was for root crops, that is, the planting of taro.

11% of land utilized was for growing tree crops as these require less management by the farmers.

A very small portion, (6%), of land is being utilized for vegetable crops this month. We anticipate that in the next quarter there will a surge in the supply of vegetables due to the roll out of the agriculture sector response package and the coming cooler season.

Livestock



Minimal decreases were seen in the number of livestock for this quarter excepting cows and chickens. Festive season functions may have contributed to these reductions.

Local Chickens, which is the easiest livestock to manage, reported an increase in number to 1,140 for this quarter. This was due to the introduction of a new breed for egg production. Pigs, followed by goats, were the other livestock with the most numbers, but the population of goats has significantly decreased during this quarter. Cows are the other livestock kept on the island and has now been reported for the first time.
